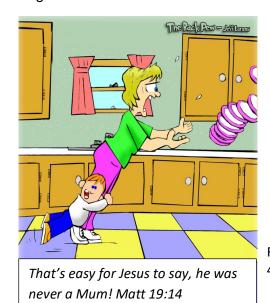

A Snippet from Bp Matt's Diocesan Update.

Many thrive off the energy that comes from relating to other people. But even the most self-contained of introverts need others. One of the most difficult things about the COVID lockdowns is the social isolation which has flowed from the physical distance we have had to endure. As the days in which contact with others has been made very tricky, if not impossible, lengthen the effects of isolation can mount. This is especially so in a nation like ours which is vast and navigates the different rules put in place by our federation of states.

We can readily understand how not being able to see loved ones, perhaps a child or parent or beloved niece or nephew, hurts. As the days between time with them lengthen so the effect on our soul drags. However, I have been fascinated as to the effect of coincidental contact with others is also missing. That conversation leading to a shared smile with a shop attendant; the chance meeting with an acquaintance at the school gate; the noise of a happy school yard at play. Our social world has shrunk as we have sought to be safe and keep each other safe.

I am reminded though through all of this that one benefit of being called as one of God's own is that I am placed with you. St Paul's uses a number of ways to describe this: We are *in Christ*, we are co-workers, we are a building and a body ... and we are a family. In feeling the loss of obvious connection with our usual circles, or missing the coincidental contact with the general community, we can forget those nearby who have been gifted to us by God.

*Set out to have one phone call a day with someone from church who you think might need to be encouraged. Once you've done that share the love with someone who does not yet come to church ...but needs encouragement too.
